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I. MISSION STATEMENT

Keeping in step with the spirit of Jesus Christ our Lord, it is our mission to provide students with an all-round education aimed at excellence in spiritual, ethical, intellectual, physical, inter-personal and aesthetic development.

We aim at cultivating our students with the qualities of a LAMWOOER: leadership, ardour, modesty, wisdom, optimism, originality, empathy and responsibility.

II. OUR SCHOOL

General Introduction of the School

Our school is an English grammar school, established by the Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui in 1970. It is an aided whole-day, co-educational secondary school.

Our school is housed in a 6-storey main building with three wings. There are 33 classrooms and twenty-one special rooms: a school hall, a lecture theatre, a student activity centre, a library, a gymnasium, a fitness room, a computer room, an English corner, an English studio, a chapel, a STEM room, four science laboratories, a music room, an art room, a home economics room and a design and technology workshop, together with an open playground and a covered playground. Computers and LCD projectors are installed in all classrooms and special rooms. Accommodation and facilities are well maintained. The buildings and even the canteen are kept clean, tidy and are fully air-conditioned.

Owing to the high academic performance of our students, our school is one of the top schools in the Kwai Ching District and one of the top secondary schools in Hong Kong.

School Management

2.1 The Incorporated Management Committee

The Incorporated Management Committee was established on 31st August 2015. It consists of fourteen members with Dr. Alice Yuk Tak Fun, BBS, JP, our School Supervisor, as the Chairperson, and Mr. Peter Cheung Chee Yin as the Honorary Treasurer.

2.2 Staff

There were 58 teaching staff members (including the Principal), six assistant teachers, one teaching assistant, three laboratory technicians, two IT support staff members, eight clerical staff members and ten janitors.

2.3 Qualifications of the Principal and Teachers

- I. 98% obtained a bachelor's degree.
- II. 56% obtained a master's degree.
- III. 3% obtained a doctor's degree.
- IV. 90% received formal teacher training.

2.4 Professional Development of the Principal and Teachers

To act as role models of lifelong learning for students, our teachers attended professional courses to upgrade themselves. Below were those who completed their courses in the academic year 2023-2024:

2.5 Staff Development Committee

The Staff Development Committee is committed to continuing the development of our staff to provide high-quality education and serve the tertiary education sector.

A series of staff development programmes, including various sharing sessions and workshops during the staff development days, were arranged. Workshops on "Teachers' Mental Health" and "Professional Conduct" took place, where we were inspired by speakers and teachers from other schools. We also engaged in discussions on school matters and team-building activities. These initiatives not only enhanced teachers' professionalism but also provided opportunities for internal and external professional exchanges.

Our mentorship scheme supported new teachers and assistant teachers, giving comprehensive support to their pedagogy and well-being. To nurture future educators and build a network with teacher training institutions, we offered teaching practicums to student teachers from tertiary institutions and participated in the school-university partnership with the University of Hong Kong. This partnership allowed our teachers to share expertise and gain new insights through lesson observations and interactions with student teachers.

To foster a sharing culture among staff, the first fifteen minutes of the staff development days were dedicated to teacher sharing. Teachers appreciated these sessions, noting enhanced mutual understanding and broadened horizons.

The Staff Development Fund encourages and subsidises colleagues enrolling in teaching-related courses. It was well utilised by our teachers.

In summary, the staff development activities successfully enhanced professionalism and personal development, nurtured future generations of teachers, and fostered camaraderie among colleagues.

2.6 Teacher Commendation Scheme

To enhance teachers' image and promote public awareness of respecting teachers, Committee on Respect Our Teachers Campaign organised the 29th Teacher Commendation Scheme. Mr. Lau Kan Lung and Ms. Tam Ying Wai were nominated by teachers and students respectively and received commendation.

^{*}In order to cater for learner diversity, each level of F.4, F.5 and F.6 were split from four into five classes to give students more individual attention and support, and to provide more opportunities for student interaction.

2.8 School Administration and Management System Section

The centralised data management system, WebSAMS, is used to foster the efficiency of school administration and management. To enhance teaching and learning, reports on statistical analysis on students' academic results are provided for evaluation. School-based software is also adopted to promote more systematic data management. To facilitate students' application for university admission, Student Learning Profiles and School Reference Reports are prepared via the system.

III. ACHIEVEMENTS AND REFLECTION ON MAJOR CONCERNS

3.1 Major Concern 1: Be the Light and Be Enlightened

Achievements

- Under the "Optimizing the Four Senior Secondary Core Subjects", the scopes and horizons of F.5 students were widen by the General Education which provides a variety of learning experiences and skills sets. 112 F.5 students in total joined the 9 different courses in General Education. 5 courses were taught be external tutors and the other 4 courses were organized by teachers in different departments including D&T, HE, ICT, Music and VA. 85-90% satisfaction rates were received in both the first and the second terms of General Education courses.
- The language proficiency is also broaden for elite students who joined an online German course (under General Education for all students) started in February 2024.
- More opportunities in other learning experiences have been created via the Talent Pool. Talent Pool is opened for all students and parents to fill in their interested fields, so that teachers will be easier to find out students for suitable programmes. We have divided more than 90 types of activities into 13 categories for students to input. 152 students provided information in the talent pool.
- Helps were provided to students with various developmental needs, such as lack of motivation in studying and stress from academic results, by social workers and teachers who have been continuous observations. Several cases were closely followed.
- Students have more exposures in STEM. The STEM Room is now open for Robotic courses, Makers' workshop, aviation course, image processing workshop, 3D design and modelling, VR games development, blockchain and financial technology courses, AI enrichment course and STEM competition preparations. Many students were involved in various competitions and workshops. In the second term an AI workshop will be co-organized by CUHK and our teachers.
- To allow students to share the knowledge in particular fields, 6 T-talks were conducted by students in the whole school year. There were 40 students and teachers as audience on average.
- Talented students have further developed their strengths through various activities in different subjects. Various enrichment classes were conducted in Chinese, English, Mathematics and Science Faculties. Furthermore, students also participated in different inter-school competitions in History, Chinese History, Economics, BAFS and National Education.

Reflection

 For F.5 General Education courses, according to the post-course evaluations survey, over 90% of the students agreed that there were good communications between tutors/teachers and students and hope the school will run the same course again for next year F.5.

Feedback and Follow-up

- The variety of General Education courses has successfully promoted different learning goals to students, such as National and Global Identity in "Unveiling our Community's Heritage" course, Information Literacy in "Innovation and Technology" course, Life Planning in "About the Medical Field" course and Healthy Lifestyle in the "Cooking Lovers" courses. Furthermore, all courses have deepen the Breadth of Knowledge, Language Proficiency and Generic Skills in different aspects. However, the workload of organizing 18 courses in an academic year involves heavy workload. It is necessary that we can maintain a teaching assistant to help in the work.
- The T-talk is inspirational to both speakers and audience, and it helped students in

Breadth of Knowledge, Language Proficiency and Generic Skills in the public speaking. After the 3-year cycle, the T-talk worth to be continued, but it may be organized under LTD in the future and redistribution of workload may be needed.

- The talent pool is useful in giving students extra opportunities to achieve all the seven learning goals. However both the number of students and the frequency of usage by the teachers can be further enhanced. We may evaluate the effectiveness and find some ways to improve the user experiences.
- STEM Room is frequently used in various workshops and competitions. It helps students developing Breadth of Knowledge, Generic Skills and Information Literacy. To further explore students potentials, we may install some more advanced equipment such as later cutter in the future.
- The trial run of BYOD in F.2 this year is smooth, however there are a lot of expected and unexpected difficulties and concerns aroused. Further evaluation will be held to understand the concerns of different stakeholders and the impacts in Generic Skills, Information Literacy and Healthy Lifestyle., and to decide the future plan in BYOD and e-teaching.
- Through various professional exchanges and developments, teachers' skills in e-teaching and information technology has greatly enhanced in recent years. The school may install more advanced teaching aids, such as touchscreen interactive display to replace traditional blackboard. Relevant training can be given to teachers for more up-to-date pedagogy and to embrace the paradigm shift.

3.2 Major Concern 2: With Love, We Shine

Achievements

To cultivate students' positive values and attitudes

- Different organizations have been invited to deliver positive values to students. The LAMWOOER attributes, as well as the twelve priority values and attitudes highlighted by EDB, were promoted through formal lessons, form assemblies, and school assemblies.
- A structured framework of the Form Teacher Periods Curriculum was developed.
 Teachers found the existing arrangement of Form Teacher Periods for T-S communication and class affairs appropriate and flexible. They also found the learning and teaching materials useful.
- To enhance the relationships between teachers and students, a variety of activities and programmes, such as Teacher-Student Conferences, National Week, Guidance Week, Gospel Week, SU Singing Contest, and Gospel Camp were organized smoothly and successfully.

To enhance peer support among students

 The Big Brother Big Sister cum Peer Counsellor Scheme and the Pilot Scheme of Proactive Class Management in F.1 have been implemented. Besides, various student teams organize activities to enhance peer support among students.

To develop students' leadership skills

To equip students with the essential skills necessary to take on leadership roles in organizing activities, a series of leadership training workshops and camps were conducted. Examples include Prefect Team Training, ICAC iTeen Leadership Programme, F.2 Careers Day Camp Kick-off 2023, Student Guidance Team Leadership Training, ECA leadership training, Brick Adventure Programme organized by the Warehouse Teenage Club. Through a diverse range of training tasks and activities, our students can strengthen their bonds and enhance their cooperation. These ultimately prepare them for leadership positions in the years to come.

To encourage and strengthen students' engagement in community service

- To foster a stronger sense of community and promote love and care among students, various student teams organized a wide range of activities, encouraging students to participate and share their compassion with others.
- The LAMWOO Elder Academy has the potential to strengthen the ties between our school and the local community. We have successfully held three workshops and one health talk. In addition, students have been provided with numerous opportunities to engage in community service. These include participating in the CUHK Jockey Club Myopia Prevention Programme, crocheting scarves for the elderly, providing free tutorials to primary students, volunteering at Animals Volunteer Charity Limited, contributing to the Community Partner Foundation's Chinese Culture Project, and more.
- 19 F.1 to F.5 students joined the Kids4kids Youth Summit 2023. The summit equipped students to create a positive impact in the community, inspiring them with insights from cross-industry leaders to tackle real-life issues. The students actively participated in the workshops. F.2D Chan Wai Hei, F.3B Yau Yuk Lam, and F.3C Chan Pak Ho won the Young Entrepreneurs prize to organize a programme.

Reflection

- Based on the stakeholder survey, parents have expressed their satisfaction with our school's support for their children's growth and development. They believe that our school can help students develop good moral character (3.91/5), understand self-discipline, rules, regulations, and how to interact with others.
- Our students agree that our school can help them cultivate good moral character both inside and outside the classroom and actively teach them how to get along with others (3.71/5).
- Teachers have rated their satisfaction with the school's curriculum and assessment at 4.1 out of 5. They consider that our curriculum aligns well with the seven learning goals and believe that we actively implement values education through collaboration among subject panels and committees (3.8/5). Additionally, teachers have a positive impression of our school's climate, with an overall average rating of 3.97 out of 5. The highest rating was 4.22 out of 5, which was given to "good teacher-student relationships", and they believe that our school creates a caring campus climate (3.98/5).
- According to the findings of APASO-III, our students scored higher than the norm in moral awareness, honesty, and national identity, which includes responsibility, obligation, pride, love, national flag, national anthem, and achievements. They also have a higher sense of belonging and satisfaction with the school compared to students across Hong Kong, and they consider the school atmosphere to be good. Over 86% of students are "satisfied" or "completely satisfied" with their "relationship with teachers" and "what they have learned from school".
- According to data from a stakeholder survey, parents and students have a positive and favorable impression of our school's climate, with average scores of 4.1 and 3.7 out of 5, respectively.
 - Parents are willing to let their children study here, believing that students respect their teachers, get along well with their classmates, enjoy participating in activities and community service. Most of all, they think that our school is a caring place.
 - Students reported that their teachers often encourage them to learn and provide support to overcome learning difficulties (3.8/5). They also feel that the school actively develops their leadership abilities through ample training opportunities (3.6/5). In addition, students agree that the learning opportunities provided by our school can help them develop their interests and life skills (3.7/5).

Teachers rated their satisfaction with the school's support for student development at

- 4 out of 5. They agree that our school provides adequate opportunities for students to develop their leadership abilities (4.2/5) and believe that our student support services can cater to their developmental needs (4.1/5).
- Based on the stakeholder survey and daily observation, we have identified that the average score for "being able to live a healthy life, such as striking a balance between study and rest, doing enough physical exercise, and knowing how to reduce stress" is noticeably lower at 3.29 out of 5. According to APASO-III data, 79.7% of students reported that they "always" or "sometimes" feel "worried", 59.3% of students feel "tense" once a week or more, and 58.1% of students feel "anxious" once a week or more. Some teachers expressed that both teachers and students were constantly busy. Many student leaders not only have to manage their studies but also need to balance various activities, often leading to insufficient sleep and an unhealthy lifestyle. While our students' leadership abilities are above average, it is crucial to prioritize their emotional and physical well-being.
- It is important to note that there has been an increase in emotional issues and special educational needs among students. Therefore, it is crucial for the school to be attentive to this matter, allocate more resources, and provide support to teachers when necessary.

Feedback and Follow-up

- It is essential to continually promote value education and regularly update learning and teaching materials. To nurture future leaders and promote the LAMWOOER spirit, we should invite more students to lead and share during the leadership training camps and assemblies.
- Both students and teachers gave significantly lower ratings (3.29 and 3.62 out of 5, respectively) for students' ability to practice a healthy lifestyle in the stakeholder survey. Therefore, it is necessary to assist students with addressing and improving their time and stress management skills. We hope that all stakeholders of the school, including teachers, students, and parents, will continue to work together to establish a healthy, balanced, positive, and caring environment for the growth and development of students.
- Overall, our students have a fulfilling school life and are generally satisfied with their social interactions and learning. However, there is a need to pay attention to the emotional needs of students and assist them in stress management.

IV. LEARNING AND TEACHING

4.1 Extended Learning Experiences

Students were entitled to various valuable opportunities to broaden their horizons and enhance the knowledge in their areas of interests. A wide array of gifted programmes hosted by different organisations and universities such as Program for the Gifted and Talented offered by the Chinese University of Hong Kong, the Dual Program offered by the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology and the Inter-school Model United Nations conferences have brought great insights to students. In recognition of their scholastic achievements, students were also awarded the Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth Scholarship as well as membership of the Hong Kong Academy for Gifted Education and the Academy for the Talented of the University of Hong Kong, which opened their gateways to challenging but rewarding learning experiences. Besides, Junior remedial classes on Chinese, English and Mathematics, and after-school tutorial classes on Chinese and Mathematics were offered to students.

4.3 Curriculum and Assessment

To help F.1 students adapt to the English learning environment, a bridging programme on EMI subjects (Geography, History, Integrated Science, Mathematics and Citizenship, Economics and Society) was organised.

After the transformative experience of online teaching during the COVID-19 pandemic, our school has embraced a blended approach to assessment, incorporating both traditional paper-based methods and online platforms. Thanks to the widespread adoption and efficient utilisation of educational platforms such as Google Classroom and Explain Everything, this strategic shift has considerably enhanced the effectiveness of teaching and learning.

To align with the evolving trends in JUPAS and enhance students' competitiveness, our school constantly reviews the combinations of NSS elective subjects which meets the needs of students.

4.4 Chinese Activities Promotion Team

The Chinese Activities Promotion Team raises students' incentive in learning and deepened their knowledge in Chinese culture through various kinds of activities such as singing contest, writing competition, lantern riddles, short video show and book sharing competition.

4.5 Cultural and Art Activities

For junior forms, students' sense in artistic creation and appreciation via the exploration of performances, museums and galleries was enhanced under a LiveCulture Programme with the guidelines provided in the "Arts Lover Passport" issued by the Cultural Promotion Committee. Besides a variety of visual arts exposure, students also enjoyed paid visits to different fabulous performances offered by various community resources, such as the Hong Kong Arts Festival via the participation of the Young Friends. In response to the aesthetic

development in other learning experiences, activities vary from exhibitions, performances, art and crafts workshops to campus art were introduced among students so as to help them experience the bliss of beauty.

4.6 English Award Scheme

The English Award Scheme (EAS) aims at motivating students to learn and use English via different activities. In the academic year 2023-2024, various interactive activities and workshops were held, such as the first Lam Woo Chess Day, Christmas activities, art workshops to make resin keychains and bracelets, Easter Hunt and so on. During the EAS Week, the team also organised a quiz tournament, a detective game and a fun food tasting bazaar on the theme of cultures and travelling. The team also invited a representative from AFS, a student exchange organisation, in the EAS school assembly to give us more information about ways to expose ourselves to other cultures. Our French exchange student, Astrid as well as our F.5 student Elyse, who was on exchange to Belgium two years ago, also shared with fellow students their exciting experiences. It was believed that the talk had encouraged students to cultivate better English skills in order to connect with people from around the world. In addition to monthly activities and EAS Week, our regular whole-school speaking activities, namely English Speaking Day and Reading Aloud Day, were organised throughout the school year. It was pleasing to see students' enthusiastic responses to the activities held. Apart from the activities, we also welcomed patrons at the English Corner at lunchtime or after school, where they could enjoy an array of English board games, English songs and films, and also chitchat with their peers and our Native-speaking English teachers so as to enhance their communication skills in an authentic context.

4.7 Information Technology Team

The Information Technology Team aims at promoting IT in education and fostering collaboration among colleagues and students with better use of information technology.

To leverage the power of technology in learning and teaching, mobile devices were offered for teachers and students to facilitate e-learning in lessons. These devices are intended to enhance e-learning opportunities in classrooms, allowing room for more interactive and engaging lessons. Alongside the hardware provision, the team has been actively involved in researching, testing, and evaluating various applications, software, and online platforms in a bid to stay ahead in the ever-evolving technological advancement. The team has organised school-based workshops and professional development programmes as well as promoted other IT-related courses to teachers. These are conducive to the development of student-directed learning, the flipped classroom approach and the pilot BYOD scheme, empowering both teachers and students to enhance teaching and learning experiences through the effective integration of information technology.

4.8 Reading Promotion Committee

The Reading Promotion Committee continues to provide students with materials both to enrich their academic pursuits and personal development. In the year 2023-2024, particular effort was put into consolidating the Librarian Team, participating in outside-school activities, and experimenting with different activities to foster a spirit of reading on campus. These include organising author talks, book fairs, sharing sessions during form morning assemblies, cultural exchange activities, field trips, reading-related competitions, and a drama performance. Together with regular promotions of new releases and book recommendations, we hope to enhance both students' interests and abilities in reading.

To that end, we will maintain a three-layered approach in the coming year. First, we will maintain our foundation as a resource centre and endeavour to connect students with materials they need and are interested in. Secondly, we will continue to build a strong Librarian Team to facilitate reading activities aimed at strengthening reading scope and skills within the school community. Furthermore, we will continue to reach outside the school by participating in reading competitions and inter-school reading events.

V. STUDENT SUPPORT

5.1 Careers Section

Careers Section aims at providing students with information and guidance on various career paths and assisting them to make informed choices about their future. We offer students opportunities to explore their interests and aptitudes through various activities and career counselling sessions. Our goal is to help students develop the skills, knowledge, and attitude they need to make informed decisions about their future and to successfully transit from secondary school studies to either higher education or the workforce. 5.7 Moral and Civic Education Section

The Moral and Civic Education Section aims to cultivate positive values and attitudes in students through formal, informal, and integrated curriculum approaches. Our goal is to foster the LAMWOOER attributes, nurturing students and promoting national education and national security education, helping students develop a sense of national identity and a strong sense of belonging to their school, community, Hong Kong, and China.

Values education is integrated into both school assemblies and Form Teacher periods. School assemblies were organised to consistently promote positive values and attitudes throughout the entire academic year. During the Form Teacher periods, learning materials were specifically designed to cultivate the twelve priority values and attitudes in students, serving as a guiding framework for nurturing their positive values and attitudes.

The national flag-raising ceremony was conducted weekly to foster a sense of belonging to the country, cultivate affection towards the Chinese people, and enhance students' sense of national identity. In addition, the annual National Week, themed "Embracing the Beauty of Culture and Literature," was held in October 2023 to promote Chinese culture and national education, while also fostering a sense of nationhood among students.

5.8 Religious Education Committee

The Religious Education Committee is responsible for all Christian education elements and activities in Lam Woo, including curriculum planning and development, whole-school religious ceremonies and collaboration with SKH Crown of Thorns Church. We provide multiple opportunities for students, especially newcomers, to explore the Christian faith. Within the school, the team oversees the work of the Religious Studies panel, Christian Student Fellowship and Christian Teacher Cell to provide pastoral support for both students and teachers.

In the academic year 2023-2024, Christian Student Fellowship spent much effort in engaging the executive members and other schoolmates for regular meetings Friday after school. Students enjoyed getting together to do Bible studies, watch Alpha Course videos, have life-enriching discussions, make music and pray for one another. Oftentimes they felt encouraged by the sharing of fellow school members to deal with the pressure from academic work and interpersonal relationships. The teaching of God, as always, was the source of much of their growth.

Gospel Week took place in December 2024. In the morning assemblies of all forms, students and teachers were invited to share their testimonies. At lunchtime, members of Christian Fellowship gathered at the mini-stage to do busking. There were also various activities, including a crocheting workshop, detective games and sharing of glutinous rice

dumplings after school. Rev. Amos Poon of St. John's Cathedral was invited to be the speaker at the evangelical meeting. We gave thanks for a total of 57 students who pledged and renewed their faith in Christ.

In June 2024, 52 students and 6 teachers took part in the Summer Gospel Camp in Lei Yue Mun Park. The weather over the three days was beautiful and we all loved the spectacular scenery at the heritage campsite. The group had a lot of fun playing team-building games and having BBQ together. In addition, students discussed life-related topics based on the Bible and got much inspired by the sharing of Rev. Eugene Leung and a Form 5 young person of EFCC Jachin Church. It was the first time the school finally had a full-scale Gospel Camp since 2019. We are grateful for the precious opportunity to get together, owing to the hard work of Student Fellowship executive team. It is hoped that God's love and presence would continue to get across to more students in Lam Woo.

5.9 Old Students' Association

It was an exceptionally fruitful year for Old students' Association (OSA) as they organised a wide range of activities aimed at strengthening the bond between alumni and fostering both the school's development and the growth of its students.

In May 2024, OSA successfully hosted the Lam Woo Homecoming Day, a remarkable event featuring diverse activities, including badge making workshop, dart experience, yoga class, alumni busking show, simulated flight pilot experience workshop and career sharing. This event attracted hundreds of alumni who eagerly returned to Lam Woo to reconnect with their alma mater. The Mentorship Programme 2024, which was inaugurated in April 2024, proved to be yet another resounding success. The programme engaged 26 F.4 and F.5 students with 60 alumni mentors from various professional fields. The invaluable guidance and support provided by these mentors greatly contributed to the personal and professional development of the participating students. In addition to the Mentorship Programme, a variety of other activities were organised throughout the year. The OSA basketball competitions, the Saloon sharing on the topic of mental health and human resource management, the alumni singing contest, and the promotion of the alumni choir for the school's summer concert were just a few examples. These initiatives played a significant role in fostering stronger connections among Lamwooers, promoting camaraderie and creating a sense of community.

Overall, the year was marked by a series of successful events and programmes organised by OSA, all of which aimed to enhance the relationship between alumni and the school, while also providing valuable opportunities for personal and professional growth for the students.

5.10 Parent-Teacher Association

As a platform for parents to bond and share their joys and challenges in nurturing their children, the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) hosted various activities throughout this academic year. The screening of the film "Time Still Turns the Pages", in particular, was very well received. The post-screening sharing by our Principal provided much needed context and guidance in interpreting somber messages the film conveys. Other events included a parents' talk, secondhand school uniform charity sale, and a picnic. Parents fellowship meetings named $\lceil \text{$\%$} \text{$\%$} \text{$\&$} \text{$\searrow$} \rfloor$ that were held nineteen times also provided our parents with much spiritual support.

In commemoration of the PTA's 25th anniversary, a range of events, namely a "Parent-School Communication Symposium", "Leisure Healing Booth Game Activities", and a "Big Bowl Feast", were held in March. They were precious opportunities for mutual support among parents and for the school to propagate our education philosophy.

It has become a tradition for parents to bake delicious cookies to support and cheer for our F.6 students in December. On the Teacher-Student Fun Day in April, the PTA arranged for a Mister Softee ice-cream truck to be parked in the school's Tung Cheng Garden. Students formed long queues awaiting such delightful treats amidst a day of activity. It went a long way in adding to the festivity of the day. In June, our parents prepared a scrumptious lunch buffet for the 30th "Parents-Also-Appreciate-Teachers Drive" as a token of gratitude for our teachers' devotion and hard work.

Besides, our school is indebted to dedicated members of the PTA volunteer team who assisted in examination invigilation, student outing activities, Speech Day and Teacher-Student Fun Day. Last but not least, the PTA donated funds to subsidise various activities such as the World Choir Games, study tours and the Leadership Training Programme.


5.11 School Health Promotion Committee

VI. STUDENT PERFORMANCE

6.1 HKDSE Examination 2024


110 F.6 students sat the HKDSE 2024 and they performed very well. They obtained 268 Level 5 to 5** (including Mathematics Extended Parts). On average each student attained Level 5 or above in 2.44 subjects. 11 students scored Level 5** in two or more subjects. 6D Chen Tsz Yeung achieved 5** in four subjects. 84 students (76.4%) obtained 20 grade points or above, which is equivalent to scoring Level 4 or above in 5 subjects. 93.6% of our students met the basic university entrance requirement (332A2).



6.2 JUPAS 2024 and Offers from Non-local Universities

106 students applied for the Joint University Programmes Admissions System (JUPAS). Of these, 102 (96.2%) received offers in JUPAS 2024. Among them, 101 (95.3%) were admitted to university degree programmes in Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Psychology, Global Business, Engineering, Science, and Professional Accountancy, among others. Eleven offers from non-local universities, including the University of Cambridge and the University of Sydney, were received.

Besides, two of the F.6 students have been directly admitted to the Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) programme and the Bachelor of Business Administration in International Business and Global Management (IBGM) programme, respectively, at the University of Hong Kong via School Nominations Direct Admission Scheme (SNDAS) before the release of the 2024 HKDSE Examination results.
